Why complete a record book:

This record book is not meant to be a chore. It is another way for you to learn more about your project. Here are some points as to why 4-H expects you to complete a 4-H record book for your project.

- Learn how to organize yourself.
- Develop leadership abilities, build character, and become responsible citizens.
- To develop integrity, sportsmanship, and cooperation.
- Learn how to set reasonable goals for yourself.
- Keep track of your project costs.
- Gather information needed to apply for scholarships & awards.
- Meet the requirements to participate in some county, state, or national 4-H events.
- Explain what you've learned.
- Recognize things you learned in your 4-H project this year and compare your progress and successes year over year.

Swine record book guidelines:

- One record book can be completed for all of your swine project animal(s).
- Record books should be treated like a book report.
- Record books should be neat, complete, and legible.
- Your record book should start when your project starts. Track your project from start to finish.
- You may submit your book by stapling it together or using a protective paper or plastic folder.
- Record books are due on the day of set up <u>JULY 17th @ the St. Clair County</u>
 <u>Fairgrounds.</u> Books can either be handed in to one of the swine superintendents or to the fair office at the fairgrounds by 8 p.m.

General Information:

- Discovery day is MAY 2nd @ 8am-11am:
 - Please bring your registration papers filled out correctly and legibly.
 - You will receive 1 bag per exhibitor with your assigned tags.
 - Pigs must be tagged and photos of your tagged swine sent in through email within 1 week (May 9, 2020).
- Fair set up day is <u>JULY 17th time to be determined</u>:
 - Please join us for setting up the swine barns.
 - Completed record books are due at set up. They may be hand delivered to either a
 Swine Superintendent or dropped off in the fair office at the fairgrounds by <u>8 p.m.</u>
 That night.
- Weigh-in day is **Tuesday**, **July 21st**:
 - Pigs should arrive clean, no mud, no feces, no stains

Prior to unloading, swine will be checked for cleanliness.

If your pigs <u>are not</u> presentable you may be asked to pull your trailer forward, clean your animal(s) and return when completed OR be allowed to unload, weigh in and instructed to take them directly to the wash bay where you will clean your animal(s) before proceeding to your assigned pen.

THIS IS YOUR PROJECT. YOU ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR YOUR ANIMALS.

DO NOT LEAVE YOUR PIGS IN THE WASH BAYS UNATTENDED.

YOU NEED TO TEND TO THESE TASKS QUICKLY.



A docile large white breed brought over to the US in the early 19th century, from England. These pigs produce large litters

A red breed of pig that's name is from a stallion owned by Harry Kelsey in 1823. This breed has a strong, thick winter coat that can stand cold damp winters. During the summer the molt and almost appear bald.

A white breed, that originated in Chester County Pennsylvania.
Ancestry includes the Lincolnshire breed. These pigs are great mothers that produce large litters. Very, durable animals.

This breed is one of the earliest
American breeds of hogs that still
exist today. Thought to be imported
from England, by sea to the U.S.
These pigs are black with a white belt
that crosses the over the shoulder
and circles the body including the
legs.

This breed was developed in Iowa & Nebraska during the 1920's. This red pig was established by combining 3 breeds; Duroc, Chester White, & Poland China. This breed is named after a breed of cattle.
